Voices of the Earth is arranged for a number of accompaniments:

A. Full Orchestra

Parts available on rental

B. Two Pianos, with optional Timpani and Four Percussion

Score, to be purchased for conductor and pianists, contains full size piano parts

Percussion parts available on rental

C. Winter - Store [from Movement IV]

Arranged for Children's Choir, Piano Duet and optional Glockenspiel part.

Optional Harp part available on rental, may be substituted for Piano I

Performance Notes for Piano Parts in Section III

All glissandi on the strings should be played as smoothly and evenly as possible. They may be done with the fingernails but if a louder sound is needed, a flat rubber surface like a kitchen spatula will give a richer sound. Do not use anything hard like a guitar pick which produces a metallic, clicking sound. Owing to the structural differences in various grand pianos, it may be necessary to adjust the position of the chords in this section up or down. Between m. 136 and 146, the sound should flow up and down continuously with the pedal remaining down until the next chord begins. If the pianos do not have a two octave range available on the strings for glissandi, player II may play all the bass clef chords of both piano parts up an octave, depressing the keys silently with one hand while playing glissandi upwards on beats 1 and 3, while player I does similar glissandi on all treble clef chords of both piano parts downwards on beats 2 and 4. If grand pianos are not available, a synthesizer [i.e. DX-7] with a suitable *celeste* patch could be used for all notes marked as plucked strings and all chords marked 'glissandi on strings'. Chords from m. 136 to 146 would then be played on the keyboard as evenly arpeggiated chords, moving up and down as indicated.

In the arrangement with percussion, any bars marked [celeste] should be omitted from the piano part.
